



Breathing space

The idea of building on paddocks in Great Linford generated an enormous reaction from residents after the Parks Trust included them in a list of 25 parcels of land they were willing to consider for development.

Part of the rationale was to boost Parks Trust finances, as their investment fund had lost 30% of its value in the recession. The good news is that following consultations, and with their finances in a better position, the Parks Trust has decided to reduce the number of possible development sites to six, and has removed the Willen Lane and Wolverton Road paddocks from the list. See page 6 for the report.

But just when many residents were heaving a sigh of relief, up pops a fresh plan to build houses at Linford Lakes, north of Wolverton Road; a sensitive wildlife area and popular with anglers.

Barratt Homes, who have described it as a 'joint venture' with the Parks Trust, propose to build over 11 hectares of land on the site, up to the edge of Blackhorse Lake. The plan is for up to 250 dwellings, 4 'chalets', and a visitor centre with parking for up to 200 vehicles. The remaining 59 hectares would be a Country Park; when not flooded!

Politicians are constantly telling us that the UK needs to build more homes, and as a parish that welcomes new opportunities we approach each development proposal with an open mind. However, GLPC has a duty to take the long view, and in this case we are conscious of the need to get the balance right between conservation and growth. This development proposal is likely to be a hot topic for some months to come. For more on the subject please see page 5.

Facilities include a state of the art auditorium, which is used for training seminars, product launches and conferences. Volkswagen Financial Services (UK), Blakelands

From its cheerful receptionists to senior managers in rugby shirts (well, it is dress down Friday!) Volkswagen Financial Services gives an instant impression of confidence and warmth. That has to be a great asset, as the business provides finance and car insurance to customers of the entire VW group, including Porsche, Audi and Skoda.

VWFS is growing fast; by 2018 they will employ over 1,000 people, and Paul Baylis, Corporate Communications Manager, says "we're keen to fill as many roles as possible locally."

Next year, the company will move into impressive new headquarters nearby. "Our executives aren't going to be on the top floor, but on the second floor, in the heart of the business," says Paul, over models and drawings of this massive £36m investment.

The architecture looks stunning: an asymmetrical 'u' shaped building, around a spacious courtyard, where people can talk business or socialise.



Collaboration has been key to the project, with staff involved at every step. From choosing its name (One Delaware Drive), to being consulted on the workspaces, cafes and funky artwork, the employees must have had fun. This philosophy is probably why VWFS is one of the best places to work in Britain – and that's official, according to the independent survey, 'Great Places to Work'.

Paul, whose career has taken him round the world, is new to Milton Keynes but impressed. "The infrastructure is perfect around here, and a big advantage is being able to expand right next door to our friends at the VW group."

Where's Woolly?

If you go down to Downhead Park you might spot some curious sheep peeping out from the trees. Look a little closer and they tell a tale of centuries gone by.

Before Milton Keynes was built, the field hereabouts was known as Down Head Furlong so the new city planners named the area Downhead Park, after the place of the same name in the Cotswolds. Tadmarton, Fairford (Crescent) and Colesbourne (Drive) are also Cotswolds' names.

When a small park in Fairford Crescent needed renovation, project manager Phil Snell of MK Council asked residents at the nearby sheltered housing scheme for ideas. They suggested the theme of Cotswolds' sheep, and the resulting sculptures are now part of an attractive new garden which includes ornamental grasses, seats and an area for playing boules.

Sudgrove House resident Carol Barac says "It's let in a lot more light and made a huge difference. I can see the sheep from my window and I'm very fond of them!"

Phil, who also made the sculptures, explained the story behind the sheep. In the 15th century many landowners pushed peasants off the arable land and brought in huge flocks of sheep for the lucrative wool trade. 'The sheep will eat anything,' said the aggrieved peasants, 'including our livelihoods!'

"Taking a little poetic licence," says Phil, "the arrival of Milton Keynes in the 20th century was another 'invasion'. But this time we humans displaced the sheep!" So he made the sheep from an alien material (stainless steel) and made some go 'missing' by stamping them out of the metal and dotting them around Downhead Park.

NEW FUNDS for Dragon Park

GLPC is hoping to win around £100,000 in grants to pay for much-needed improvements to Dragon Park in Great Linford. If approved, the revamped park will include something for everyone, from teenagers to toddlers and their parents. Plans include a new trampoline, hurricane swing, talking flowers and picnic tables as well as special areas for parkour and skateboards.

Nine play area companies tendered for the revamp and after carefully sifting through each one, we chose the company that best covered residents' requests. GLPC has to make a strong case for winning the first grant from WREN, a not-for-profit business that funds community, conservation and heritage projects for people who live near landfill sites. Our weighty application included material from the 'Take back our park' campaign, photographic evidence of long-term vandalism and neglect, and detailed improvement proposals and costs. If the WREN bid for £48,000 succeeds, MK Council has agreed to match-fund the project and, all being well, the work would start at the end of summer.



NEW HOMES heading for Linford Lakes?

Over forty years ago the clank and roar of gravel extraction near Newport Pagnell came to an end and a major restoration project began. Nature has since woven a rich tapestry of wildlife at Linford Lakes, and it now contains one of only two dedicated nature reserves in Milton Keynes.

Kingfishers, dragonflies and even otters are just some of the creatures who rely on this mosaic of habitats. According to County Bird Recorder, Andy Harding, it is “arguably the most important site in Buckinghamshire for birds.”

So when Barratt Homes announced plans to build housing and a new Country Park in the area in “a joint venture with the Parks Trust”, many locals were taken aback. As well as its potential impact on wildlife, there are questions about traffic, infrastructure and flooding.

Barratt’s propose to build up to 250 homes between Oakridge Park and Redhouse Park, plus a new country park and “multi-use” visitor centre with up to 200 parking spaces. The country park would occupy most of the site (59 out of 73 hectares) and would arguably form a natural extension to the (long overdue) linear park promised to residents of Oakridge Park.

Nationally, the pressure is on to build more homes, but although 15,000 new homes are already planned for Milton Keynes, Simon James of DLP, Barratt’s planning advisors, says the strategy is out of date. “It’s a sustainable site,” he says, “well-located to the rest of the city and the services within it.” At this stage, he says, “Our task is to analyse any potential impact on drainage, road safety and wildlife, and resolve any issues. We will not submit a planning application that is not robust, in all regards.”

However wildlife enthusiast Tony Bedford is not reassured. Tony is chair of the Friends of Hanson Environmental Study Centre (FoHESC). The Centre welcomes school parties and visitors to enjoy the 40 hectare Nature Reserve in the heart of the lakes.

“The Nature Reserve’s location within the Great Ouse wetland corridor, along with its surrounding buffer of rivers, lakes, meadows and trees, all contribute to its success; as does limited human activity,” says Tony. “But

this development would smash a large hole in the barrier and destroy a significant part of the habitat. Add to that three years of construction work and it will inevitably drive out species such as owls forever.”

In an interview with North by NorthEast, Phil Bowsher, Head of Landscape Strategy for the Parks Trust, said “As MK continues to grow we want to see new parkland to go with it. As a charity, this is what we do; for the public benefit. Yes, we’ve been talking to Barratt’s and come up with some consultation ideas for the parkland area. For a site that size there should perhaps be a visitor centre, toilets and car parks. But there’s no joint venture. The only potential PT interest is a future one, if the development takes place. And that’s a big ‘if.’”

The type of parkland it might be is still an open question. “Setting it up as a destination park might not be the best way,” says Phil. “Barratt’s have gone in at one extreme. Another extreme would be to set it up as a nature park. But does it justify that? I’m sure a lot of people might want to enjoy it as an open space. Should we provide for them? Can we balance the two? We have to see what comes out of the [environmental] studies and consultations.”

“Clearly, the Linford Lakes complex is a special place,” says Councillor David Stabler, of GLPC, “which is why it is officially designated as Open Countryside, a Wildlife Corridor and an Area of Attractive Landscape in the MK Local Plan. Quite apart from its ecological impact, I am surprised that Barratt’s want to build up to the floodplain after all the bad news last winter.”

To guide its response, GLPC has already adopted a series of principles:

- GLPC opposes piecemeal development which could impact the whole of Milton Keynes.
- Development should not adversely impact GLPC residents, services or put unacceptable strain on existing roads, schools, shops etc.
- New developments must adhere to MK Planning policy and not set a precedent for development outside the Core Strategy.

RANGER'S Report

Cleaning graffiti in Conniburrow, blitzing litter in Blakelands: time flies when you're having fun! It's hard to believe that it's two years since I became Parish Ranger. Parish councils are changing and my own role is certainly taking some exciting turns. With MK Council (MKC) changing too, our partnership grows ever stronger as we try to ensure residents feel safe, happy and proud of their neighbourhood.

One recent joint project was a "Dog poo spraying pilot" on the Redway from the Grand Union Canal through Downhead Park via the underpass into Downs Barn. We installed signs and a number of bag dispensers along the route so there were no excuses to break the law. Well, even I was shocked on our first day out. In just half a mile we spray-painted 110 of the offending piles! Serco moved in to clean the area and we will repeat the exercise to gauge its effectiveness, sharing our new-found knowledge with MKC's Enforcement team.


We are also on the track of speeders. I have just completed training with MKC Highways in the use of SIDs (Speed Indicator Devices). These are the signs that display a green smiley face if you are driving safely and a red frown if not! As well as reducing speed, it helps us identify which roads need particular attention.

Our spring 'Bike marking day' with Thames Valley Police was a great success with 31 residents bringing bikes along for security marking. Thanks to our local PcSo's Tony Holden and Zach Tidy for working through some rather large queues. Another event will take place later this year.

This summer your Ranger's calendar is busier than ever, with two neighbourhood Tidy Up Days each month, Summer of Fun events and the Community Festival to name a few. However my main aim is to visit every estate to complete a Local Environmental Quality survey. This helps me pick up new issues, schedule in any work I can do by myself (such as cleaning graffiti) and report any other findings to relevant partners. My mission, as always, is to ensure that our lovely parish receives as much 'TLC' as possible.

"Unthinkable" Paddocks Project

The Parks Trust recently announced that it had dropped the idea of selling paddocks in Great Linford to fund parkland improvements. North by NorthEast met with the PT's Head of Landscape Strategy, Phil Bowsher, and Communications Manager, Nadir Farrell, to find out more.

Q: Have you abandoned the idea completely or could it return?
PB: The odds of that happening are very low. The Trust put its head above the parapet with proposals to improve Manor Park and possibly sports facilities. But there just wasn't the support from the parish and community.
Q: PT said it had been 'contemplating what to some people is unthinkable' due to financial pressures, so has the situation improved?
PB: Yes. Our commercial properties took quite a hit in the recession, falling by about 30%, and that was a big driver to this whole idea. But after working on our plan to improve the long term financial position

of the Trust, it looks better now than it did back in 2009.
Q: You estimated the cost of the Manor Park project at £2m. What was the value of the paddocks?
PB: To be totally honest we did some broad estimates but never got as far as doing a detailed financial appraisal. We always thought 'let's test the idea out and if we get support then we'll do the detailed number-crunching'. There might have been £2m surplus generated from the sale of the paddocks. But we never got beyond the ideas stage.
Q: But you invested quite a bit of effort in the Manor Park idea. How much did that cost?
PB: Including the leaflets and consultants

approximately £25,000. That includes £15,000 for the Conservation Plan for Great Linford Manor, which is a piece of work we would have done anyway. It's one of our key areas of parkland and we understand it much better now.
Q: Has the public perception of the Parks Trust changed?
NF: In the wider public, we don't know, but we're doing market research over the summer so we'll test that out. In Great Linford a lot of people weren't aware that we are an entirely self-financed charity and don't cost taxpayers any money. So whilst people might have been worried or upset, it did give people a better understanding of why we do some of the things we do.

CONNIBURROW 'BIG LOCAL' NEWS

Big Local is a ground breaking project, funded by the National Lottery, which aims to achieve lasting change in 150 small areas across England. Conniburrow was awarded £1m to spend over ten years to make the area an even better place to live. Big Local Conniburrow is run by residents who alone decide how to spend the grant.

After researching residents' views, the steering group has identified three priorities:

Conniburrow Pride: To improve how we regard our estate and how it is perceived by others, to make it a place where people want to live, to encourage an active, happy and healthy community.
Social Cohesion: To gather and enjoy each other's company, improve neighbourly relationships, address issues concerning young people, the elderly, those with disabilities and ethnic minorities.

Physical Infrastructure: To improve the physical appearance of Conniburrow, encourage better maintenance, improve the parks and transport links.

These priorities are about to be submitted along with a plan and budget to the Local Trust for approval and release of the grant. Spread over ten years we recognise there is a limited amount we can do and we hope to find other partners to help make the money go further and build a better community.

Much has already happened: Fun Days, work with Southwood and Germander Park Schools and sports days with the MK Dons Sports Education Trust. Last year I joined the project as part-time community development worker and for the 'Year of Conniburrow 2014' we are running a variety of monthly events.

Any Conniburrow resident is welcome to attend our monthly meetings and we are looking for more citizens to join the group with responsibility for executing the plan. Even if you can only commit to a small amount of

"They shall not grow old..."

To help commemorate the men of Great Linford who served in the Great War, GLPC has given a parish grant of £400 to restore a Roll of Honour in St Andrew's Church, which sadly was in need of repairs. The manuscript records the names of around 100 people who served in the war, with the names of the men who lost their lives picked out in gold. "It's a fine piece of calligraphy," says local volunteer Jill Clarke, who applied for the grant, "but over the years it had got water-damaged, the frame was broken, and it ended up hidden away at the back of the church. Thanks to the parish grant, we could send it to a professional restorer and we hope to return the roll of honour to its rightful place, beneath the war memorial plaque, in good time for August 4th." On that date, exactly a century ago, Britain entered the First World War. David Kent, a fellow volunteer, is also preparing a booklet on life in the village leading up to the war, with profiles of each of the fallen men. Any proceeds from selling the booklet will go towards upkeep of the historic church.

FESTIVAL FUN FOR ALL

Every June the Waterside Festival brings the grounds of Manor Park alive with music, crafts, food and fun in a free event open to all. Depending on the weather up to 3,000 people visit Great Linford over the weekend and the GLPC grant of £2,000 provides security to ensure the safety of visitors and equipment. Anne Slee, festival secretary, says "The festival has something for everyone: live music, entertainment, dance, bookstalls and dog show in a very relaxed atmosphere, in a beautiful setting." Anne is one of a regular group of volunteers who work very hard to stage the event and keep it fresh with new elements, such as archery and a literary stage for the spoken word.

"It costs about £25,000 to stage the event," says Anne, "and we just about break even. So donations such as the regular parish grant are essential to keep the Waterside Festival going."



YOUR NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Upcoming workshops



Your Neighbourhood Plan has got off to a great start. The questionnaire went live in April and over 600 households have responded so far. Typically only two or three percent of residents respond to these surveys but so far over 10% of households in some estates have replied.

Already, the initial results are proving useful, with clear patterns emerging on certain topics. For example, there is immensely strong support for protecting open space across all districts, while residents in new areas such as Redhouse Park have flagged up the need for more local shops and services.

After analysing all your replies the next important step will be the drop-in exhibitions and workshops in July (see calendar, left). This is for residents to review the survey conclusions, and to help us fine tune the ideas into a draft plan. More details of the workshops will be published shortly, so look out for our posters and information on the parish website. There is still a way to go, but with your help we are making big strides.
